
WONDER WORLD

What does a rural church do with an elderly congregation of around 35 people? If you're Community Life Church (formerly Grand Harbour Baptist Church, Grand Manan, NB), you get on your knees until God exchanges your grim future for a vision of a vibrant ministry to kids and teens.

After being hired as part-time Children's Pastor, Joy Green put together a "dream team" to examine needs of children in the community and God's plan to address them. The result was the creation of "Wonder World," a weekday ministry to kids in Kindergarten through Grade 5. Along with a volunteer staff of thirty-five to forty teens and adults, the church is now filled on





two hour Wonder World experience consists of a live teen worship band led by Youth Pastor Brent Green (Joy's husband) along with times for play, art and going deeper.

Now in its second year, the community's response to Wonder World has been overwhelmingly positive, and has been suggested by several teachers to be making a difference in the public school. It has also spurred on the creation of a new Sunday Morning children's ministry appropriately named "Camp Wonder."

INN FROM THE COLD

Sponsored by the Bridgewater Ministerial (NS) and concerned community members, "Inn From the Cold" is a program designed to provide food and overnight accommodations to those needing somewhere to go during the cold winter months. Adopting a similar model from the Annapolis Valley, local churches take turns opening their doors one evening per week to provide shelter and to minister to those who find themselves in need.

Since 2009, Bridgewater Baptist Church, other churches in the ministerial and key volunteers have offered time and resources to help make this ministry a success. In the first year, Bridgewater Baptist used its vacant parsonage four nights a week. The people helped are often transient, in crisis and/or young people who have fallen between the social network cracks.



Senior Pastor Rev. Eric Campbell has witnessed the impact this has had on the community. "What has happened is that there is an awakened awareness of the need Christians and others to help when and spirit of cooperation in the Town."



When I joined the team at Crandall University a number of years ago, I did so because I believed in a university that was both ministry-oriented and missional in nature. While there are still many challenges, we are making a difference as we


move forward.




