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



# Celebrating OASIS

Our Annual Gathering was held on August 11-13 at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia.





We began Oasis with Cultural Immersion: Embracing Our Afircan Nova Scotian Family, a day trip to important sites for our Black brothers and sisters. We were honoured to have Rev. Dr. Rhonda Britton as our keynote speaker for the event, and we welcomed workshop leaders to help us engage well in the conversation around addressing racial injustice in our churches and neighbourhoods.



Oasis was hosted at Acadia University for the first time since 2018. We were thrilled to simply be together again—and being in person was especially meaningful for us. Across three days, we gathered for rallies, after-hours hangouts, partner updates, workshops, BBQs, and prayer times.



The business sessions are an essential part of our participation as a denominational family. We gathered for two sessions on Friday, August 12th to consider and vote on our agenda. We're grateful that our churches and leaders can have a voice in how the CBAC moves forward! You can find the documents for these business sessions on the Oasis website.



Oasis Kids and Oasis Youth were amazing! We are so thankful for the teams of leaders from Middleton Baptist Church (Nove Scotia) and Douglas Baptist Church (New Brunswick), leading these dynamic programs for chidlren and youth at Oasis this year.



When I walk through the lodge doors at Camp Tulakadik, I love looking at the old photos on the wall, a reminder of the vision held by ministry leaders a few generations ago. Beginning with tents set up on the shore of Cassidy Lake in 1961, how could those early leaders have envisioned what it would be in 2022? With thirteen CBAC-affiliated camps actively running ministry this summer, our shared ministry influences the lives of thousands.

Camp ministry has held a significant role in developing ministry leaders across Atlantic Canada. Countless

pastors and other ministry leaders were shaped by their years in camp ministry. Jacob Sorenson (author of *Sacred Playgrounds*) writes, "Summer camp has never been more valuable. What began as a series of tender shoots in the 1880s has grown into a thriving biome that nurtures life and offers a source of fruit for the church and the world. It has become an integral part of the ecology of faith formation."

Our camps thrive when well-supported by our churches—when all of us participate in their ministry and celebrate their stories. The **1000 Mile Challenge** is an

example of this support. In March, two snowmobilers set out across New Brunswick, completing 1000 miles in less than 24 hours and raising over \$76000 for camper registrations.

Camp Wildwood (NB) is one of our oldest camps, tracing its roots back to 1912 with a vision of creating a "safe place of acceptance, growth, and love." This vision continues to be lived out today, as evidenced by the experience of a young staff person who showed a camper that she could come to the Lord in times of trouble and hurt.

This young cabin leader's story began with a camper had received a scrape early one week while playing a game. After having the scrape treated, the cabin leader took time to pray for this camper who was unfamiliar with prayer, and seemed disinterested in learning about God. But later in the week, when another camper took a tumble, the camper was quick to grab her cabin leader to pray for this other child. This is one out of many stories that show the potential for growth and encounter within the camp environment.

Another significant moment comes from Camp Pagweak (NS). At a campfire with a Q&A time, a young boy raised his hand and asked the profound question: "What does it mean that the Kingdom of God is here now?" A staff member who was there says, "It was in this moment that I remembered the impact of camping ministry and how vital it is that we make the most of our God-appointed opportunities as Christian camps. Through the work of the Spirit and through the work of the staff team, this child was able to grasp a deeper understanding of the Kingdom of God and that that Kingdom is for him. It is privilege to join God in His Kingdom work at camp as we seek to make Him known and share with youth that the Kingdom of God is not simply a far-off reality but that we can be a part of it in the here and now."

These two encounters highlight that camp ministry has been an integral part of faith formation in our region. They're also an invitation for our churches to continue supporting the significant work of our camps-because there is Kingdom work that is done in our entire CBAC family-in leadership development, in faith formation, and in changed lives.

# Venntle Canadian Baptist Ministries Launches New Faith + Work Global Initiative

My story is quite common and may be relatable to you. Prior to being appointed by CBM in 2015, I worked in small business. I enjoyed my work and was dedicated to delivering quality service and offering the best products possible. I was also very involved in my local church and saw my involvement as meaningful and valuable to God. I struggled, though, to see how my daily work, my Christian faith, and church involvement connected. I struggled to see how my work provided me with regular opportunities to participate in God's redemptive mission in the world; or how my work was in fact, ministry, or that I could be "called" to it in the same way that I might be called into 'ministry'.

I felt regular tension between the responsibilities of my day job and wanting to serve God with my life, which up until this point, I believed meant serving on a church committee, playing guitar on the worship team, or leading a small group. I couldn't possibly serve God through my daily work, could I? Can you relate to anything of this?

As a global mission organization seeking to embrace a broken world through word & deed, CBM has seen the tremendous value of God's people living out their faith, not just on Sundays, but the other six days as well. The global church has emphasized so adamantly the church gathered and neglected the vital part of the church scattered out into homes, communities, schools, workplaces, and around the world. The truth is both the gathering, and the scattering of God's people are important for spreading the Gospel and building God's Kingdom.

Over and over again, we have seen the phenomenal impact that 'ordinary church-goers' have on helping shape local communities, often through their daily work. They are teachers and health-care professionals, government employees, tradespeople, truckers and farmers, businesspeople, merchants, and day-labourers. They understand that God had called them to live out their faith in and through their work. On the other hand, we have also heard church-leaders send confusing messages that God's work is only what's being done in the church; singing in the choir, teaching Sunday school, being a deacon, serving on a committee, or sometimes, just being a means of generating income for what they understand to be God's work (i.e., in the church). Sometimes people feel like they are second-class citizens in the kingdom, sometimes disparaged for choosing what has been labelled as 'secular' work vs the 'sacred' work of the church.

These realities have sent CBM on a journey over the past number of years; a journey to discover the connections between faith and work, whether paid or unpaid, formal employment or household chores. The fact is, everybody works, even students have 'homework'. Our work matters to God and coming to a deeper understanding of how our daily work connects with God's work is crucial in becoming whole-life disciples.

For this reason, CBM has launched a whole new Faith+Work global initiative, which we call VENNTURE, aimed at helping people discover how their faith meets work. When faith meets work all the hours of our lives can be infused with meaning.

You might be wondering, 'why did they spell their name incorrectly'? Well, it's not a mistake, but let me take a moment to explain our reasoning. Many of you will know what a Venn diagram is: two-overlapping shapes that demonstrate the logical relationship between two or more sets of ideas. It was named after a British mathematician, John Venn, in 1880, who was trying to help people understand how seemingly opposing concepts can actually be closely linked together. So, a simple version could look like this:

As our new VENNTURE logo shows, we see that discipleship is the great integrator, the very heart of life as God's people. It is where faith meets work and equips people with useful resources to live out their faith every single day of the week.



VENNTURE is strategically working within our partner framework through a tri-fold approach, which is quite straightforward:

- 1. **FORMATION**: Through sound biblical teaching, training, coaching, and mentoring, VENNTURE is helping equip the whole people of God to participate in God's work and to bring about transformation.
- 2. **CREATION:** VENNTURE works within a partner network and in a spirit of mutuality, to assist in the creation of transformational businesses that lead to human flourishing and provide meaningful work for individuals.
- 3. **MOBILIZATION**: VENNTURE is building networks in order to mobilize God's people to see their work as mission and accept their role to help heal a broken world through it.

We are excited to launch this important new work on behalf of CBM and our partners locally and around the world. The locally-based mission event, empowering young people to lead and engage the entire congregation to join them in serving their neighbourhood.

Many student ministries take the opportunity to plan local serving projects during the summertime—and these initiatives remind students and churches that God invites us to participate with him where we are, and to share in the love that God has for our neighbours.

Mission tours have long been significant to the youth ministry culture of Atlantic Canada. We have seen lives changed as teens serve together in community. Mission tours strengthen both peer and intergenerational relationships, and they reinforce the value of serving the local community—building partnerships and simply blessing our neighbours. These are opportunities for teenagers to grow

to grow in leadership and important reminders for adults of the capacity of teenagers.

As the CBAC, we are committed to joining God in our neighbourhoods and inspiring churches to live on the edge of mission where they are. Tidal Impact is a long-running event that invites youth groups to travel to a region for a week. However, we wanted to continue encouraging churches to find ways to serve in their own communities without needing to travel. We wanted churches to be asking what God was doing in their own neighbourhood, and how they could participate in that.

To facilitate that, the CBAC's Youth &

Family department has created a set of resources called **Undercurrent**, which empowers young people to lead and serve their neighbourhoods through partnerships in their community. No two Undercurrent initiatives look the same, and the experience doesn't need to be called Undercurrent. Whether a church uses the name or resources, we celebrate when students find creative ways to impact their neighbourhoods.

Serving together is a significant way to impact a student's faith, creating lasting memories and strengthening the intergenerational and peer relationships that are so significant to their faith journey.

The opportunities of a local-focused mission event like Undercurrent can be life-changing for students and everyone else who joins in, serving Christ every day, everywhere, particularly in their own neighbourhoods.



### Middleton Baptist (NS) and Cornerstone Baptist (PEI)

Middleton Baptist (NS) hosted Cornerstone Baptist (PEI) for a week in July 2022 for their Summer Serve event. Through nursing home visits, car washes, VBS, cookie baking, and even a concert, students from these churches served together.

Rev. Hannah Bartlett (Cornerstone Baptist) reflects on the week by recalling an outdoor coffee house their students planned in support of Ukraine, unsure of how many people would show up. "We had a great turnout, served cupcakes, home made cookies and root beer floats and raised I think \$400 for Ukraine. That was all student dreamed up and they pretty much executed it themselves! A cool offshoot was there was a seniors apartment complex right around the corner and they came outside to hear the music. Our students brought them over cookies and cupcakes, and they were so thrilled!"



RiverCross Church (NB) and Forest Hills Baptist Church (NB)


This summer, RiverCross and Forest Hills Baptist Churches partnered together and facilitated an Undercurrent experience at Arrowhead Bible Camp, a summer camp for First Nations Children. Team members from those churches spent the week serving as cabin leaders, activity leaders, and filling maintenance roles. One grade 8 team member writes:

"Undercurrent was a very meaningful experience for me. It brought me closer to Jesus and taught me to seek Him every day. Working at Arrowhead taught me to show God's love to others. Undercurrent changed my relationship with Jesus for the better." She recognizes that she learned to take time to help others, by spending the mornings organizing sheds and hanging out with the campers throughout the days. She appreciated the connections she made with a couple of campers through meaningful conversation and sharing her own experience of kayaking with another camper.

In every organization, there's always work that doesn't make the headlines. Here are some things that you might not have realized we're doing to support our churches.

Our Finance Department can handle <u>Pre-Authorized Debit</u> giving for your congregation. Our Finance Officer, Debbie Barriault, is open to chat about that and other questions you may have about church finances—including payroll questions, tax forms, and more.

We have negotiated a group cell phone plan with Bell Mobility, which can provide adequate data, affordable cell phones, and favourable terms to eligible church staff and spouses. Andrew Myers (andrew.myers@baptist-atlantic.ca) can answer any questions you may have.


For pastors and congregations in transition, we have a website page for <u>ministry openings</u> for CBAC and affiliated ministries, as well as a regularly-updated <u>Pulpit Supply & Interim list</u> of pastors who could be available to give help.

Our Leadership Development department holds an annual event called **Explore**, an orientation designed to be one of the first steps in the process for leaders pursuing ordination in the CBAC.

Kevin Vincent, Director of New Congregations, has developed and produced videos on YouTube called **reShape 333**. These videos offer easy-to-understand concepts and conversation starters for your church's leadership team, designed to help you shape vision and kickstart a new moment in your ministry.

We have a benevolent fund for pastors and their families who are experiencing financial needs, as well as for pastors' widows and widowers. Traditionally this has been called the **December Communion Offering** fund, and our churches are invited to support this by collecting an offering near the end of the year.
